

Out of Province Health Cards

Some of the out of province cards are depicted here so you can become familiar with them.

British Columbia

Regular Card



Red, blue and yellow on a white plastic card with personal health number, issue and expiry dates, birth dates and name of holder. Registration number is a 10 digit number that always begins with 9.

Senior's Card



Gold plastic card with white print personal health number, issue and expiry dates, birth dates and name of holder. Registration number is a 10 digit number that always begins with 9.

Saskatchewan

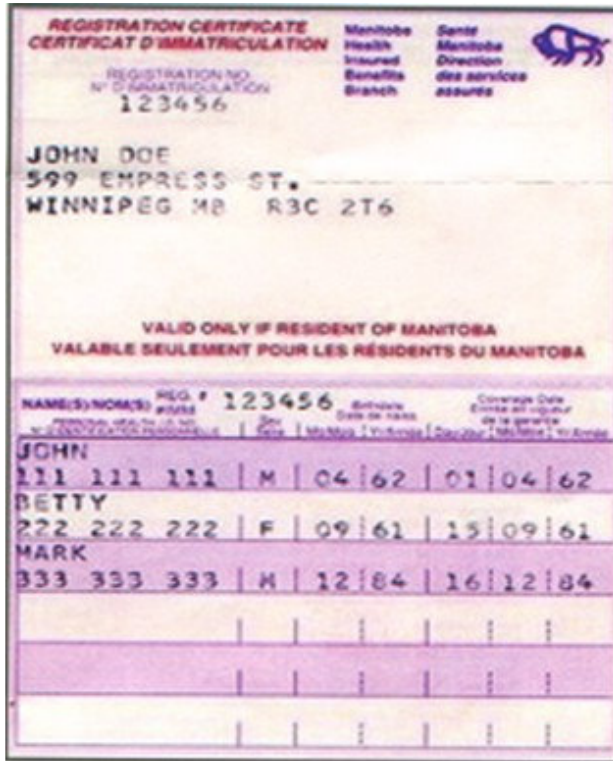


Blue and gray plastic card with black print with card holder's name, sex, month & year of birth, effective and expiry dates. The personal health number is a 9 digit number.

The expiry date of the card is the date imprinted on the card or the expiry date on the renewal sticker - whichever is the later date.

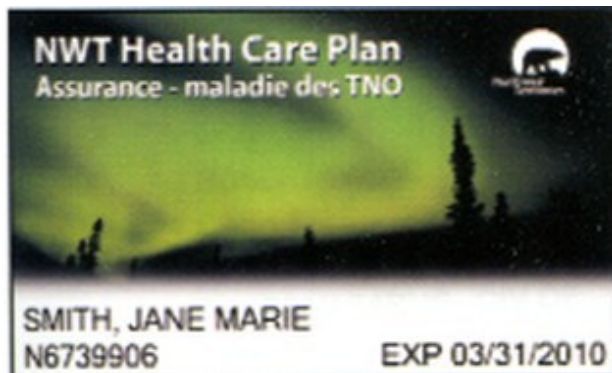
The plastic cards are blue above and grey below a green, yellow and white stripe. The stickers are light green with a gold sheaf and green printing. Cards contain a personal health number, name, effective date for coverage, termination date for coverage, sex, and beneficiary's month and year of birth.

Manitoba



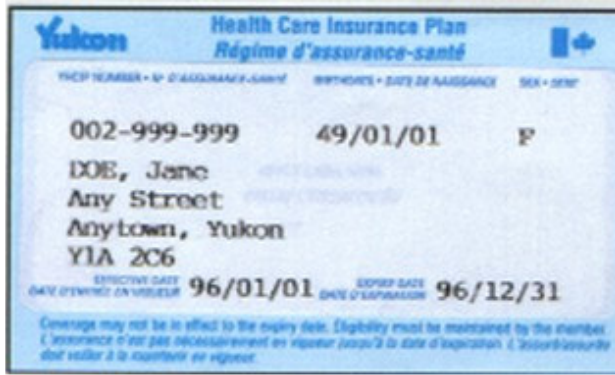
White paper with purple print. The card contains a 6 digit registration number for registrant and all dependants. Card shows the name and address of holder and the names, sex, birth dates and coverage dates of all dependants. Effective April 1, 2005, a 9 digit unique lifetime identifier number is used for each registrant.

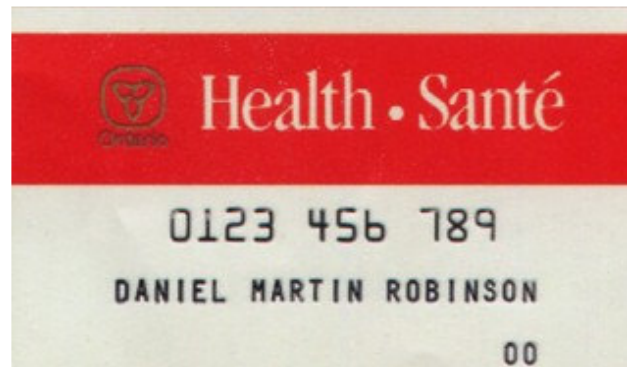
Yukon Territory



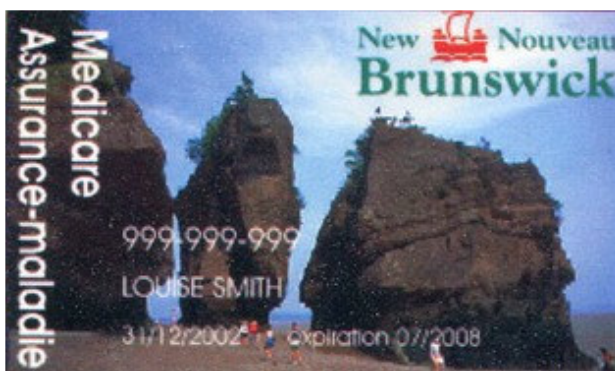
The plastic health care insurance cards are light blue in colour with dark blue print. Labels are also light blue.

A green health care card is issued to Yukon senior citizens registered with the Pharmacare and Extended Benefits programs, replacing the blue health care insurance plan card. This one card entitles holders to all senior's benefits, hospital and physician services. Persons are eligible for the card if they are a Yukon resident aged 65 years or older, or if they are 60 years or older and married to a living Yukon resident who is 65 years of age or older.

Ontario

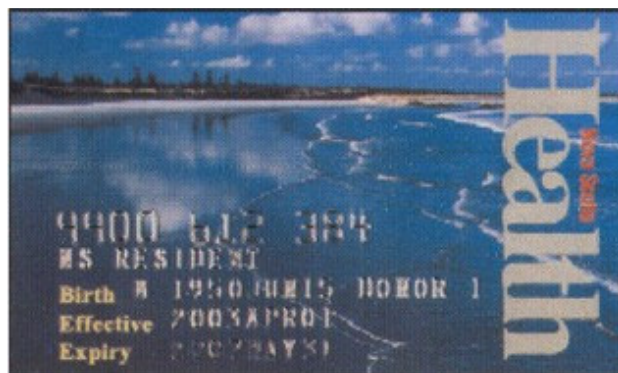


New Brunswick



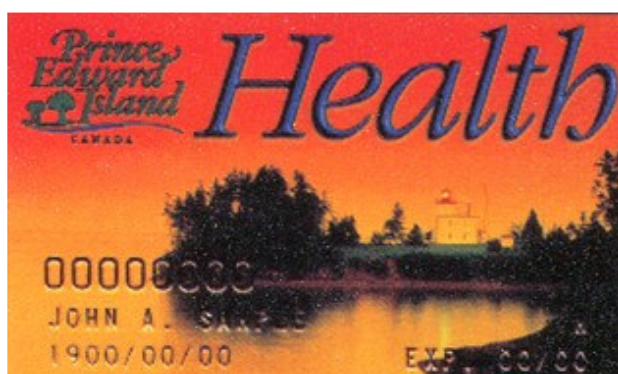
The plastic card with a magnetic-stripe depicts a New Brunswick scene of the Flowerpot Rocks - Hopewell Cape. The New Brunswick logo is displayed in the upper right hand corner. The card contains the 9-digit Medicare registration number, the subscriber name, date of birth and expiry date of the card. This information is in silver, embossed lettering. This card supersedes all previous cards.

Nova Scotia



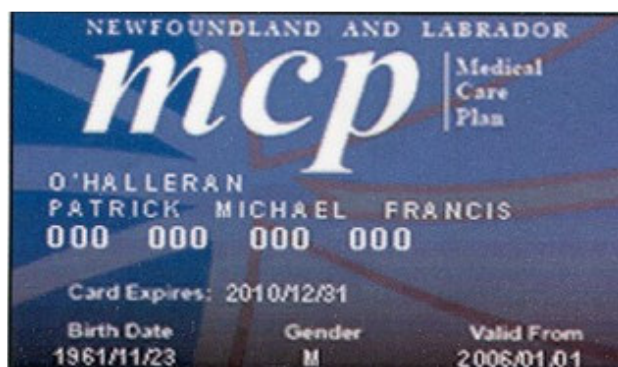
The magnetic-striped Health Card assigns a unique 10-digit lifetime identification number to all Nova Scotia residents. Also displayed on the card are the given name, surname, gender, birth date, effective date of MSI coverage, and expiry date of Health Card. Also, if an individual wishes to be an organ donor, the word "DONOR" with a 1-digit code will be embossed on the card. The signed Health Card with donor notation is a legal document.

Prince Edward Island



The new magnetic-striped personal health card replaces the Province's plasticized paper card. The card assigns a unique 8-digit lifetime identification number to all eligible P.E.I. Residents. Also displayed on the card are the given name(s), birth date, gender of the resident and expiry date of the health card. The personal health number becomes effective December 1, 1996.

Newfoundland



There are two cards in circulation. The one shown above is the newer one. One with 'mcp' in very large letters (approx 1/4 of the card) is the older one. Card shows the registrant's name and a 12 digit registration number.
